

Park Projects & Programs

A Living Ecosystem: Environmental Education for Kids

RPC partnered with environmental educator Suzanne Thompson and organic landscaper Petie Reed to provide a series of hands-on workshops for elementary school children and their families. Sessions were held on Saturdays from June through December, as students engaged with nature throughout the seasons while their parents shared ideas for future park planning. The program was made possible through a grant from the Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut.



Environmental Remediation

Replacement of invasive plants with native pollinators continued on "the slope" which stretches from Stanners Street into the park. Seed balls, made at a Living Ecosystem session, were tossed in areas that have been cleared but not yet replanted. Stakes have been purchased, and markers will be added as soon as plants emerge in spring.

"Art in the Park" has also been added to our Neighbor Day celebration in May, with art supplies provided for children who'd like to take part.
