New London's really hopping

Historic regatta, music, kids' activities on tap

he city of New London continues to celebrate its 350th auniversary with another weekend of events

On Saturday, a community picnic in Riverside Park celebrates New London and its ties to America's oldest intercollegiane athletic event, the Yale-Harvard Regatta. The regatta, in its 131st year, began racing on the Thames River in 1852.

The races begin at 4:30 p.m. with the freshman race, and the senjor race follows at 7 p.m.

Regatta activities begin in newly restored Riverside Park at 11 a.m. and continue until 9 p.m. Picnickers can bring their own food or food can be purchased at the gark. There are picnic tables and some grills available. Among the food items on sale are barbecued ribs and thicken, hot dogs, hamburgers, waternelon, lemonade, icad tea, soda pop. ice cream, cotton candy, popcorn, and cookies. All proceeds from food sales go the B.P. Learned Mission and the GREAT Program at the Bennie Dover Jackson Middle School.

Children's activities coordinated by the New London Department of Recreation include glant bubble making, face painting, games, and story telling at the pavilion from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Also for the kids, Bridget the Midget and Tennessee Tuxedo will offer pony and Ilama rides from 2 to 3 p.m. Softball and basketball courts will be upon all day for those interested in a bit of friendly conpetition.

Musical entertainment will be provided throughout the day. From 1 to 2 p.m., the Sea Notes Barbershop Chorus will stroll the park in screande picnickers. From 2 to 3 p.m. The Silver Coronets, a group of 30 slayers, will perform. From 3:00 to 4:00, Please and Thank You, a three member string band, will perform on the main stage. From 5:00 6 p.m., Stephen Kennedy Murphy, as Eugene O'Neill, will perform songs mentioned in "Ah, Wilderness" and other O'Neil works, and popular tunes from the Gay Nineties. From 6 to 7 p.m., enjoy traditional Irish music with Gan Anim. The musical events are topped off with a performance of Finest Kind from 7:30 to 8 p.m.
